
Big, big thanks to everybody who made the long journey (and, of course, the long journey home) to play for us down here in Austin! The

# THANK YOU TO OUR EXITING BOARD MEMBERS




I'd personally like to thank Cody Mabe,

Former CTBA President, **Stacy Holt**, passed away in November, following a brief bout with pancreatic cancer. Beyond his love for all genres of music, Stacy worked for IBM for



30+ years and was in the U.S. Marine Corps Reserves. Stacy, along with wife Becky, moved to Austin in 1988 where they raised two daughters. Stacy dabbled in fiddle and drums and hooked up with Eddie Collins for banjo and mandolin lessons. From there he began frequenting the local jams and music festivals. He answered the call when asked to join the CTBA board, eventually becoming President and leading us through some challenging times. There are plans to share

some tunes in Stacy's honor at the monthly Bluegrass Open Mic to be held on Thursday, January 9th, 7-9 PM at the New World Deli, 4101 N. Guadalupe, Austin. CTBA owes a debt of thanks to Stacy for his tireless help in promoting the music we love that touches so many lives.

And **Spencer Drake**, founder of the San Antonio-based **Ledbetter Bluegrass Band**, passed away this past December. Playing primarily banjo, but also fiddle and guitar, Spencer formed the band in the late 1980's along with his wife, Kathy Connolly Drake, on rhythm guitar and vocal. They often played as a trio in the early days with Dave Reiff on bass. Others pickers who frequently joined them include Larry Miller on Fiddle, Jeff Long on mandolin, Christopher Teague on lead guitar, Christopher Borchers on bass and Katy Rose Cox on fiddle.







Kathy passed away in January of 2022. In addition to performing throughout Central Texas, the couple actively helped promote bluegrass events, first through the San Antonio Bluegrass Club in the early 1990s and later as members of CTBA. They both will be remembered as wonderful entertainers and all around great folks that always had a good word to say about their fellow musicians.

## **SPINNING WAX**

You're a Nashville luminary. A bona fide country star. If this were 1963, you'd wear golden gabardine drenched in purple rhinestones and drive a car as long as your swimming pool. Your swimming pool would be long. But it's 2025, or some other relatively recent year. Sure, you've got hits in the bank and platinum framed on the wall. No doubt you've got money, and a Belle Meade estate to prove it - not to mention that "historic" winery you shouldn't have invested in, or the children's reality TV channel your cousin called a "sure bet," certain to "avoid any serious legal blowback." And the thrills? The swagger? The godlike command of the stage? "Come on," you tell yourself, "I'm a professional." As for the music - well, you remember how it used to put a smile on your face.

You're yearning for something more. You're burning for something more.

That something, late-career country headliner, is bluegrass. Nothing else replenishes the well of quote-unquote authenticity you drank dry in the licentious saloons of the demon city. Yes, bluegrass is what's needed. It is the dragon breathing soulfire back into your leaden heart. Just ask <u>Alan Jackson</u> and <u>Dolly Parton</u>. <u>Patty Loveless</u> and <u>Willie Nelson</u> and <u>Sturgill Simpson</u>. Try to ignore Robert Earl Keen's <u>regrettable attempt</u>.

The late Joe Diffie had his own bluegrass homecoming. He even called it that. About fifteen years ago, after charting five #1 country hits, the "Pickup Man" artist put out "Homecoming: The Bluegrass Album." It's got a few decent swings on it. It's also a reminder that Diffie did in fact have a bluegrass diet in his youth. Good bluegrass. So let's have a listen.



In the early 1980s, while scrabbling in factories and oil fields, Diffie performed and recorded with Special Edition, a collection of mostly-Oklahomans who cut an album on Grass Mountain Records, one of the labels under the aegis of Fort Worth-based bluegrass visionary Slim Richey. The resulting disc, entitled "Sweet Allis Chalmers," may be the best thing with Diffie's name on it. The album foreshadows Opry days to come with satisfying bluegrass offerings of the country-hued variety. These include an

ornate and appropriately energetic rendition of the George Jones chestnut "The Race Is On," which has Diffie taking the lead in the verses and the tenor in the chorus. There's also a somewhat-too-assured "When the Grass Grows over Me," a song credited to Don Chapel but maybe actually penned by his temporary wife Tammy Wynette. Diffie might have handled the vocals weepily, but instead he does so acrobatically, as is often his way during the thirty or so minutes of "Sweet Allis Chalmers." Canonical bluegrass singing tends toward the forthright, which can make Diffie's stunts and summersaults feel a little fussy. But he had A&R execs to impress.

Another estimable performer here is Billy Joe Foster, who would go on to gigs with Ricky Skaggs and arch Texas grassers Country Gazette. Foster was even a Blue Grass Boy, for a time. Hailing from the musical Mecca of Duncan, Oklahoma, hometown of Hoyt Axton and Ralph Mooney, Foster makes for a stark contrast beside Diffie. There's an ease and friendliness to Foster's delivery, even while he's picking the petunias out of the banjo and fiddle. His original song "Blue Memories of Mississippi" is harmonically and melodically creative, notwithstanding clear stylistic debts to the Osborne Brothers. (Both bands also recorded Jimmie Helms's "Searching for Yesterday," with Diffie warbling the lead vocals on behalf of Special Edition.) Another Foster original, "Hey Baby (You've Lost Your Hold On Me)," feels like a Country Gazette track in waiting. It moves nicely, by virtue more of pep than of speed. On the banjo, Foster mostly follows the Scruggs template, with a few of his own evolutions and flourishes. For the group's adaptation of the Credence smash "Up around the Bend," however, Foster goes full-on Scruggs, an unexpected approach given that the rock 'n' roll

source material might lend itself to exploratory treatment. Foster fiddles that one too.


Guitarist Marc Keller and mandolinist Craig Fletcher get plenty of work throughout, and there is no effort to hide Terry Fletcher's electric bass, with its cottony swell and fuzz. Not that the band is ever other than tight. And the possible friction between Foster, who is all cocoa and campfires, and the diva-to-be Diffie never materializes. Quite to the contrary, Special Edition sounds cohesive and, indeed, distinctive. When these divergent musical creatures found common ground, it turned out to be new territory.

The title track of "Sweet Allis Chalmers," on which Country Gazette also left its mark, comes courtesy of the revered songwriter Bill Caswell. Though born in Austin, he grew up in Bartlesville, Oklahoma, which I'm told is "the primary city of the Bartlesville Micropolitan area." So he must have known his way around a fetchingly orange tractor of the Allis Chalmers brand—or, more likely, he'd seen one from the window of a passing automobile. Or in a magazine. Caswell was an adman, not a farmer, and his Madison Avenue legerdemain came in handy when writing a song. "Sweet Allis Chalmers" is about being lonesome, of course. But, like a sneaker ad or a country star's bluegrass homecoming, it's also a self-conscious mobilization of fantasy. Rural fantasy, in this case. Chess pie at a yankee Thanksgiving. Special Edition's recipe goes down just fine.
